Every student is required to have a scientific calculator. Calculators built into cell phones and PDA's are unacceptable. Calculators should be brought to every class meeting. Calculators cannot be shared during examinations.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is a continuation of BAN 232 and is designed to introduce the use of statistics as a business tool in the face of incomplete knowledge. Topics include: estimation, hypothesis testing, analysis of variance, goodness-of-fit measures, correlation, simple and multiple regression.

COURSE OBJECTIVE

The student will have learned:

1. how to apply statistics to improve thinking, problem solving, and decisions.
2. how to analyze and critically evaluate ideas, arguments, and points of view.
3. the fundamental principles, generalizations, and theories of statistics.

COURSE EVALUATION

There will be 4 mid-term exams and the final.

Points will be awarded in the following way:

Best three mid-term exam scores <i>(there will be 4 mid-term exams, each exam is worth 100 points)</i>	300pts
Bonus points (for homework, participation and attendance)	25pts
Final Exam (comprehensive)	100pts
Total available points	425 pts

All students must take the final exam which will be comprehensive. Since your lowest mid-term exam will not be used in computing your course grade, there will be NO MAKEUP EXAMS – a missed exam will be scored as a zero. NO EXTRA CREDIT is possible under any circumstances.

The exams will be closed book. More complicated formulas will be provided. Each exam may be a combination of multiple choice, short answer questions and numeric problems. For each examination, you will need: a calculator, a scantron and a no. 2 pencil. Exam scores will be posted on Blackboard.

You are expected to work on the textbooks and online problems for each section that is covered. Homework will be assigned, but not always collected.
